

# THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER 10:00 AM, APRIL 30, 2023

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Eastertide. The Church celebrates the resurrection with a feast of fifty days. On Fridays in Eastertide special acts of discipline and self-denial commemorating the crucifixion of the Lord are not practiced. "Alleluia" is said or sung repeatedly during our liturgy. The Paschal Candle burns

throughout Eastertide. The central Christian belief is that Jesus was crucified and rose from the dead. In our worship this is not a past or an abstract reality. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is remembered and made present in our worship and in our common life. "Jesus Christ, yesterday and today, the Beginning and End, Alpha and Omega. His are all times and ages. To him be glory and dominion through all eternity." "Easter" is the English language name for the Sunday of the Resurrection. In most languages, the given name is some form of the word "Passover." Easter celebrates the "Passover" of Jesus from death to life.

## WELCOME TO CHRIST CHURCH

The Parish of Christ the Redeemer (known as Christ Church) is the Episcopal Church in Pelham, New York. The Episcopal Church is part of the Anglican Communion which is made up of 85 million people in over 165 countries and is the third largest Christian denomination in the world.

Christ Church was founded in 1843 and is the first house of worship in Pelham. This building was consecrated on September 15, 1843, the original church building was expanded in 1910, and the sanctuary was reconstructed in 1968 to allow for the current, more intimate worship space. Our congregation draws primarily from Pelham, New Rochelle, Mount Vernon, and the Bronx, and includes people from diverse denominational and cultural backgrounds. Whether you are new to Christ Church or a long-time member, you are invited to pray in our sacred spaces, join in our services of worship, and take an active role in the life and leadership of the parish. We give thanks and praise to God for your presence with us this morning!

Children of all ages are always welcome in church. A great place for children to see, hear and participate is in the front pews of the church. Also, childcare is available in the Nursery every Sunday during the 10:00 AM Holy Eucharist. Sunday School is offered during the academic year from September until June. Sunday School begins at 10:00 AM each Sunday. After the children's service and Sunday School activities, the children join the rest of the congregation for the Holy Communion.

If you believe God may be calling you to a new relationship with him through Jesus Christ we want to be of help. Whether you want to receive the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, receive the laying on of hands by the bishop in the sacramental rite of Confirmation, or transfer your membership from another church or denomination, joining Christ Church is easy, just speak to Father Matthew Mead, Deacon Chisara Alimole, or our Administrator, Ms. Marie Main.






Reader A Reading from the First Letter of Peter.

For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps. "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth." When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. #### ABOUT THE MUSIC

Benjamin Britten (1913-1976) was a leading British composer of the twentieth century. Born in the coastal town of Lowestoft, Suffolk, on the North Sea, he was the youngest of four children born to the dentist Robert Victor Britten. Recognized as a child prodigy pianist and exposed to a rich musical life by soirées his mother, Edith, hosted in the family's home, Britten also learned to play the viola and began composing at a very early age. His mother's friend Audrey Alston taught him the viola, and introduced 14-year-old Benjamin to her friend, the composer Frank Bridge (1879-1941), who was impressed with his talent and began teaching him the craft of composition.

After winning a composition competition at the Royal College of Music in 1930, he studied composition with John Ireland and piano with Arthur Benjamin there for three years. His first professional successes were his Sinfonietta in 1932, and the short oratorio *A boy is born*, composed for the BBC Singers in 1933. Through Frank Bridge's influence, Britten met Adrian Boult, the BBC's music Odirector, and given the opportunity to score documentaries for the BBC, where he met and

collaborated with W H Auden, whose friendship was a powerful catalyst in Britten's early professional life. In 1937, after his mother died, Britten met the tenor Peter Pears, who was to become his life companion. Together, they lived in New York for a period from 1939 until 1942.

Britten's anthem *Jubilate Deo* is a setting of the hundredth psalm meant for liturgical use at a choral matins, an ordinary canticle for the traditional Prayer Book service of Morning Prayer. Composed in 1961 on commission from H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh for the choir of St. George's Chapel, Windsor, it has been a staple of the Anglican choral repertoire ever since.

Orlando de Lassus (c. 1530/2-1594), also known as Orlando di Lasso, was a Flemish composer of the late Renaissance. Born in Mons, during the reign of the Spanish Habsburgs, Lasso appears to have distinguished himself at an early age as a boy chorister in the church of St. Nicholas. Biographers suggest that he was thrice kidnapped because of the particular beauty of his singing and taken into service elsewhere. By the age of twelve he had traveled to Mantua and later to Milan in the retinue of Ferante Gonzaga, General of Charles V's Imperial Army. By 1553, he had been appointed the Choirmaster of the Basilica of St. John Lateran, the seat of the papacy, a position he held for only one year (Palestrina succeeded him there in 1554). In 1556, he joined the Munich court of Albrect V, Duke of Bavaria as a singer and composer-in-residence. His compositions made him famous around Europe, and both Andrea and Giovanni Gabrieli are believed to have traveled to Munich to study with him. In 1570, Lasso was granted the then-rare distinction for a composer by the Emporer Maximillian II, who elevated him to the nobility.

Lasso's setting of the Easter Responsory Surrexit pastor bonus (The Good Shepherd has arisen) is especially appropriate on this Sunday, as we recall Jesus, the Good Shepherd, and chant the twenty-third psalm in accordance with the lectionary. Scored for 5-part (SSATB) chorus, the motet begins with a rising fourth motive on the word "surrexit" (arisen), an obvious example of text-painting followed by a stepwise motion on "pastor bonus" (good shepherd), which continues the upward trajectory of the motive up to the fourth above the first leap, followed by a downward correction on the last syllable, which signals the end of the musical phrase and idea. Imitative, though not strictly canonic, entrances of this rising motive then appear at the interval of the fourth in each of the five voices. The use of inversions of this motive with imitative cascades of three-voice parallel triads at the words "mori dignatus est" (deigned to die) propel us to a quietly insistent "alleluia" motive in the tenor, picked up by the rest of the chorus and closing the motet joyfully.

#### PRAYERS FOR HEALING AT THE BOLTON ALTAR
