THE THIRD SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANNY JESUS CHRIST THE HOLY EUCHARIST JANUARY 21, 2024







This is the Third Sunday after the Epiphany. This period in the Church year is known as the "Epiphany Season" or "Ordinary Time." The term "ordinary" refers to how the New Testament passages are generally read in order or in sequence, as opposed to being arranged by specific theme as in other seasons. During this season the Gospel passages focus on the beginning of Jesus' ministry and how he is revealed to the world as the Christ. In Year B (the first in a three-year cycle: A, B & C) most of the Gospel passages are from the Gospel according to Mark. The Old Testament Lesson and the Psalm are chosen because they relate to the words and message of Jesus. The New Testament Lesson is independent of these readings and is almost always taken from one of the Letters in the New Testament that reflects the common life and mission of the first Christian community.

WELCOME TO CHRIST CHURCH

The Parish of Christ the Redeemer (known as Christ Church) is the Episcopal Church in Pelham, New York. The Episcopal Church is part of the Anglican Communion which is made up of 85 million people in over 165 countries and is the third largest Christian denomination in the world. Christ Church was founded in 1843 and is the first house of worship in Pelham. This building was consecrated on September 15, 1843, the original church building was expanded in 1910, and the sanctuary was reconstructed in 1968 to allow for the current, more intimate worship space. Our congregation draws primarily from Pelham, New Rochelle, Mount Vernon, and the Bronx, and includes people from diverse denominational and cultural backgrounds. Whether you are new to Christ Church or a long-time member, you are invited to pray in our sacred spaces, join in our services of worship, and take an active role in the life and leadership of the parish. We give thanks and praise to God for your presence with us this morning!

Children of all ages are always welcome in church. A great place for children to see, hear and participate is in the front pews of the church. Also, childcare is available in the Nursery every Sunday during the 10:00 AM Holy Eucharist. Sunday School is offered during the academic year from September until June. Sunday School begins at 10:00 AM each Sunday. After the children's service and Sunday School activities, the children join the rest of the congregation for the Holy Communion, escorted into the church by Even Felicetti, our Director of Children's Ministries.



new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."







Members of other Christian churches who are baptized are also invited to receive the Body and Blood of Christ. Persons who do not wish to receive Holy Communion are also invited to come forward with everyone else to receive a blessing (cross your arms over your chest to indicate that you want a blessing and not Holy Communion).



ABOUT THE MUSIC

Choral Selections

Sydney Bertram Carter (1915-2004) was an English folk musician, songwriter, and poet. He read history at Baliol College, Oxford, and graduated in 1936. As a committed pacifist, he was a conscientious objector in World War II, and did foreign service as a part of the Friends' (Quaker) Ambulance Corps in Palestine, Egypt, and Greece. After the war, he had a long career writing musicals and musical reviews with Donald Swann. He is best-remembered for his carol text *The Lord of the Dance*, which he adapted to the famous American Shaker melody, also popularized by Aaron Copland's *Appalachian Spring* ballet: *Simple Gifts*, or "Tis the gift to be simple." Carter's carol text offers a lively gloss of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, using the metaphor of a dancer who cannot stop dancing. The second verse references this morning's gospel reading and the calling of James and John to be Jesus's disiciples.

David Valentine Willocks (1919-2015) was born in Cornwall and trained as a boy chorister at Westminster Abbey under Henry Walford Davies. In 1939, he was appointed organ scholar at King's College, Cambridge. His studies were interrupted by service in the British Army during World War II. In 1945, following the war, he returned to Cambridge to complete his studies, becoming a Fellow of the College in 1947. He served for two years as organist for Salisbury Cathedral, and then went to Worcester Cathedral, where he served as cathedral organist and principal conductor of the famous Three Choirs Festival until 1957, when he returned to King's College, Cambridge, as its Director of Music. Through his tenure at King's, where he served until 1974, Willcocks gained an international reputation as perhaps the foremost English Church musician, primarily through the college's annual international broadcasts of Christmas Lessons and Carols, for which he wrote many treasured carol

arrangements. His arrangement of Carter's *Lord of the Dance* gives this beloved 20th century folk hymn a classic Anglican choral treatment, dressing it up, as it were, for church.

Tómas Lúis de Victoria (c. 1548-1611), was the most famous Spanish composer of the sixteenth century. Born in Ávila, Victoria was educated as a choirboy in Ávila's cathedral. He is known to have been an accomplished organist at a very early age and seems to have had considerable success as a singer, as well, because in 1565, he was appointed the Cantor for the German College in Rome, which had been founded and directed by St. Ignatius Loyala in 1552 and where Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina was the maestro di cappella (choirmaster). When Palestrina returned to his previous position as director of the Julian choir in the Vatican at the church of St. John Lateran, the Episcopal seat of the Bishop of Rome, Victoria was appointed choirmaster of the college. In 1573, he was also appointed to serve as choirmaster and instructor in plainsong (Gregorian chant) for the Pontifical Seminary in Rome, which was at that time also under Jesuit control. In 1574, he was ordained a priest by the English-born Thomas Goldwell, Bishop of the St. Asaph diocese in Wales, who had rejected the English Reformation and was living, more or less, in exile in Rome. With Palestrina, who was most likely his teacher and mentor, Victoria is regarded as one of the greatest composers of the Roman Catholic counter-Reformation. In 1584, Victoria was appointed priest and choirmaster to the monastery of the Descalzas Reales in Madrid, when his friend and patroness the dowager empress Maria entered that monastery's cloistered life. He served as her chaplain.

Organ Selections

Frank Bridge (1879-1941) was born in Brighton, England, ninth child of William Henry Bridge, with his second wife Elizabeth Warbrick. The elder Bridge was a violinist, teacher, and variety show conductor who came from a family of tradespeople. Young Frank grew up playing violin in chamber ensembles and filling in for other musicians in his father's bands and making musical arrangements for those same ensembles. From 1899 to 1903, Frank Bridge studied at the Royal College of Music in London, where his principal teacher was Charles Villiers Stanford. As a young professional musician, he played second violin in the Grimson String Quartet and viola for the English String Quartet, and sometimes conducted the Proms concerts for Henry Wood. Under the patronage of Elizabeth Sprague Coolidge, Bridge eventually turned to a career in composition, composing in virtually every genre, including much chamber music and a small number of pieces for the organ, for which he wrote very idiomatically, despite not having been an organist himself. Bridge is also known for having been Benjamin Britten's private composition teacher. The *Allegretto grazioso* from *Six organ pieces* is a charming character piece featuring a wistful melody played on some of the solo stops of the organ.

George William Henry Faulkes (1863-1933) was born in Liverpool, where he lived for most of his life. A pupil of William Dawson and Henry Ditton Newman, Faulkes was an accomplished organist and published over 500 works for the organ. He served two churches in his long career as an organist, first, St. John the Baptist Tuebrook and later St. Margaret's Anfield, where he had been a boy chorister under Henry Newman. He also conducted the Anfield Orchestral Society. His *March in C* from *Five Pieces* is a stately work, redolent of the optimistic British fin de siècle period in which it was composed.
