From Father Matt: Growth in 2024-2025



Our last issue of Soundings was two years ago, and much has happened. In this issue, I want to focus on what we are doing to facilitate our Parish's growth and wellbeing.

Over the past two years we have had two major staffing changes. In mid 2023, I called Mr. Evan Felicetti as to serve as Director of Children's Ministries, a position that the parish had not had for more than a decade. In the first half of 2024, following an extended national search that yielded over 30 excellent candidates, I called Dr. Justin Bishof to serve as our new Director of Music. Also in 2024 we also began a much needed overhaul of our parish database and communications. This issue will include more information about our new staff members and their ministries, but I think it is important to share with you how happy I am with these changes and updates.

We are blessed and lucky to have Justin, and his title, Director of Music, reflects a change in the direction. Justin brings a desire, the talent, and track record to grow our children's music ministry, and he understands that children are essential to music at Christ Church. Similarly, he brings needed energy to revive our concert program. He has already programmed a robust concert series with several of the most sought-after organists in the New York area for 2024-2025 to celebrate the 5th Anniversary of our Juget-Sinclair pipe organ. Justin is, in his own right, a world-class organist and concert director who tours internationally, and we are fortunate that he will not only be part of our concerts series each year, but playing the organ every Sunday – his improvisations, preludes, and postludes are marvelous. He has met with our choir members, and we are all excited for our upcoming choral season which begins on September 15 and how it develops throughout the year.

Justin and I are liturgically and musically on the same page, and I have enjoyed planning liturgy with him this summer as we move into the autumn. He is living on the parish grounds in the second-floor apartment of the old parish house, and he has already done much cleaning, updating, and reorganizing our music spaces. He has bonded with the staff and has made a great effort to meet and greet as many parishioners as possible in the past two months – despite the fact that he broke his foot a few days before he started and has been on crutches. If you haven't already done so, please stop and in and say hello to Justin. He is happy to welcome you into his office, have coffee or lunch, and get to know you. The music on Sunday mornings this summer has been glorious, and I am looking forward to our choir season which begins on September 15. Justin sent out a helpful letter in early July outlining some of his plans for 2024-2025, and it is republished in Soundings.

We are entering our second year with Evan as our Director of Children's Ministries, and I am thrilled at the progress we have made. Evan is again overseeing Vacation Bible School, Sunday School, the Christmas Pageant, and Youth Group. Evan has provided a number of helpful metrics and updates in this newsletter which I encourage you to read. Vacation Bible School (VBS) took place from August 19-21, and our attendance right now is tracking about as full as last year. Our Sunday School year begins with Blessing of Backpacks and Registration on September 8, and Sunday School classes formally begin on September 15. Confirmation Class will begin in late September or early October. If you have children under age 18, Evan will be in more contact with you this year thanks to our database upgrades, and I ask that you make active involvement at Christ Church a priority for your family this year. Please let Evan know if you want to help out, or if you have any suggestions on how to make our children's and teens' programs better. Also, please thank Evan for his hard work and fresh ideas the past year.

Evan's presence and gifts have freed me up to do many things, including some around Youth and Teens including leading a group of parish teens to the Saint Michael's Conference in Connecticut. Our attendees all plan to return, and my goal next year's Conference, July 20-26, 2025, is to have ten teens from Christ Church. This newsletter includes some fun photos and info from the Conference.

A more mundane but no less important change this year is our ongoing transition to a new, unified communications, database, website, and online giving system for the church. Our old systems were cobbled together over the past 20 years and have all become outdated. The new system is much more accessible and useful for all of the staff and our financial team. The new database will allow us to keep much more up-to-date records and will greatly facilitate communication by staff and committee chairs with individuals, groups of parishioners, and targeted audiences (like Friends of Music or Youth Group). The new website will allow for much easier online giving and mass communication that works in concert with events advertised on the website. There are a lot of great features, including an app for our parishioners. By the time this Soundings issue is published, we should be in the midst of our roll out. This may not seem like the most exciting topic, but I'm thrilled. It will be a wonderful upgrade for the staff and should make a big difference keeping in touch with all of you.

Lastly a note of thanksgiving and celebration. Ed Blue has been Sexton at Christ Church for 50 years. We are planning to honor him with a stone/marble plaque in the Church (there is a similar plaque to John Harness who was sexton for 30 years). You can donate to the plaque (write a check to the church with the memo "Ed Blue Plaque"), and please thank Ed for his long and faithful service. I am grateful to work with Ed every day at Christ Church. I am also grateful for the service of Marie our Parish Administrator, Chisara our Deacon, and Walter our Verger and Assistant Sexton. We have the right staff and systems in place to thrive and grow in 2025 and beyond, and I am excited and so happy to be your rector in this next stage of our parish life.

I hope you had a busy and productive summer at church and with family. On a personal note, I am in the midst of sending my son Liam off to Hobart and William Smith Colleges. Please keep him and all our recent high school graduates and their parents in your prayers! I am hopeful that this will be a truly wonderful year!

On May 28, 2024, Father Matt announced that Dr. Justin Bischof had accepted the call as our new Director of Music, and Justin's first Sunday at Christ Church was June 23. Many thanks to the members the members of our Search Committee co-chairs Jeff Bodenmann and Margaret Young members, Andrew Des Rault, Stephen Dolan, Cherrie Greenhalgh, John Hastings, Alison Hinds-Pearl, and Martin Nash for their hard work and expertise running this search. Justin knows our Anglican liturgy well. He has a deep appreciation for the sacred choral tradition that is cherished at Christ Church, and he understands how important children, families, and volunteers are at Christ Church. He is a gifted liturgical organist who knows and loves Episcopal hymnody and whose playing and choral leadership inspires congregational singing. He is an accomplished choir director who enjoys working with children, volunteer, and professional choristers so they can provide excellent and approachable music for the liturgy. Additionally, Justin is a renowned concert organist who performs organ concerts and improvisation recitals around the world. He is also Artistic Director, Conductor, and Founder of the Modus Operandi Orchestra which provides the opportunity for some of the finest freelance musicians in New York City to perform the staples of the great symphonic and operatic repertory as well as contemporary works and world premieres with their colleagues.

Justin was born in Canada and earned his Doctor of Musical Arts in Organ Performance from the Manhattan School of Music. He most recently served at Saint Mary's Church (Long Island City) as Director of Music and Organist. He has also served at the Church of the Epiphany (Gramercy Park, NY), the Church of Saint James the Less (Scarsdale), the Church of the Resurrection (NYC), and the Church of the Heavenly Rest (NYC).

Greetings! I am both honored and thrilled to be your new Director of Music & Organist! Christ Church has a stellar reputation in the diocese as a parish blessed with a great Rector in Father Matt, fantastic lay leadership and a distinguished history.

My vision for the Music Program for Christ Church is one of engagement, excellence, and growth. Our music program should and will play a large role in our life together by creating a sense of community and giving to others. Music is a unique and powerful way to worship God as a community whether it be singing a cherished hymn together, witnessing our Choirs sharing their gift of song, or attending a Friends of Music concert being transported by His voice through the pens of the great composers.

I am excited to announce that we are establishing a Youth Choir for Grades 2-5 that will meet every Thursday from 4:45 p.m. - 5:30 p.m. followed by pizza dinner shared with the Youth Group from 5:30 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. We will work on classic hymns and fun children's anthems while learning about music fundamentals. Artful Enterprise In Hoag Hall Pays Off

Hard to believe, but the Art Ministry at Christ Church will soon hit a remarkable milestone. Come October it will mark the second anniversary of its colorful makeover of the Church's Parish Hall into the site for a monthly series of displays of paintings, drawings, photographs, mandalas, quilts and other hanging artworks for sale from local artists, including parishioners. To date we have logged sales of seventy four items, grossing \$10,865, thereby netting over \$2,200 for the Church's outreach efforts. What's more, in September we facilitated a silent art auction of twenty eight parishioner-donated works that raised over \$1,140.

We do not charge the artists for the use of the hall, which is very unusual in the art display world. Instead, each of them agrees to donate 20% of their sales to the church. To date eighteen artists have taken us up on our offer. The shows not only brighten up Hoag Hall; they also attract non-parishioners to visit our church.

In May, we had another first, a show featuring photos from our youngest artist ever, ninth grader

Sidereus Preftakes. Sidereus sold ten works. (See photo of him closing a sale with J.D. Calder.) We will be looking for good things from him in the future!

Our current exhibition is "I Love Christ Church". It features artists: Louis Altieri, Tara Garcia, Patrice Fitzpatrick, Marilyn Leone, Davie Perez and Anne Zahner. This exhibit will be up through the summer months. Everyone is invited to bid. We will accept the best offer.

All are welcome to display their god given talents. Please spread the word.

He is a graduate of Fordham University, and of Pelham Memorial High, where he earned the rank of Eagle Scout in his final year with a project to repair sections of the Colonial Greenway trail in New Rochelle, in the wake of Hurricane Sandy.

Without the friendship and support that I received from some amazing parishioners and clergy as I grew up from childhood in Christ Church, I wouldn't be in the position that I am today. It's a role I'm truly excited about. Our remarkable parish has always given my faith plenty of room to grow. To me, Christ Church is a place where everyone can be themselves un apologetically, and all are encouraged to bring along all their baggage, good and bad.

The 2023-24 school year began with a lot of excitement around our youth ministry. For Sunday School, we had an enlarged, dedicated team of teachers working hard to inspire both our younger children, as well as pre-teens with the power of our faith. Beyond that we had a confirmation class of seven, including one adult (it's never too late to take that next step in committing to, challenging, and deepening our faith). As for extracurriculars, our youth group, made up of primarily middle and high schoolers, met every other week on Wednesday evening. My goal for all these experiences is for the youth of our parish to learn more about the faith we hold dear; all while feeling heard, as well as having fun. Being young can be a confusing time for many. It was for me. But, if we all work together, we can make Christ Church the kind of place where our kids feel comfortable, and can come to know the joy we have through Christ.

Youth Group

Our aim is to meet twice a month on Wednesday evenings, led by Father Matt and Evan Felicetti; a group specifically designed for middle and high schoolers, giving them an opportunity to have fun, make new friends, and learn a little more about their own personal faith journey. Most meetings will include dinner, an activity, and an opportunity to share with each other the triumphs and struggles that define adolescence. The overall aim is to create a community space for the young people in our parish to feel at home outside of the traditional Sunday service. In its first outing, on Saturday, October 14, several group members visited the Global Mission Fair, run by the Episcopal Diocese of New York at Trinity Wall Street in Lower Manhattan. In our final get together on April 24th, we met in the church library, watched the 1998 movie "The Truman Show" and enjoyed each other's company, not to mention large pies from Four Corners Pizza.



Pastoral care gives me the chance to share God's love with children of God in need, and food ministry provides me an opportunity to care for those in need. Meanwhile, the Order of the Daughters of the King empowers me to engage in prayer, service, and ministry as a daughter of the King of kings, Jesus Christ.

It warms my heart to pray with people of faith, serve in ministries with people with similar calling, and talk about God without reservation, inhibition, and fear of being judged, amid seekers just like me. As we find ways to strengthen our relationship with God, let us look at the world around us; let us look to nature and things that God has created because we have a lot to learn from them too. And let us continue to strive to do better in our service to God, knowing that our Lord Jesus Christ did it all for us, and has already made the way to God's kingdom for us. Amen.




BIBLE STUDY WITH THE RECTOR




One of my favorite roles as verger, is working with our acolytes as they help out around the altar during services. The good news in recent months is that two young members of the parish

We were told to swing the censer, the ornate silver vessel on chains that securely holds the burning incense, in a civilized way. No overhead, 360-degree twirls we were told firmly.

Three New Vestry Members Report In



It is an honor and privilege to be allowed to serve on the Vestry once again. It is also much different. On my first tour of duty, in 2006 - 2012, Vestry meetings tended to be long, drawn-out affairs as the

Church grappled with a host of challenges related to the state of the building, and the less than healthy state of our finances. Back then meetings often extended to 10 p.m. or later. Today, with many of those challenges having been addressed, we manage to conclude business far earlier.

The news is not entirely good, however. If there is one concern of the Parish in this Year of Our Lord 2024, it is that we are missing a key constituency - families with kids. Particularly those with children in the 8 to 14 range, arguably the most important age for young people to attend and get involved with church life. This was a concern even before the pandemic hit, and it remains the greatest lingering damper on our Parish family. For these reasons, my prime concern in the year to come is to revive our outreach to families - whether through more Family nights, teaching Sunday School, or trying to find more events for parents and children together. I read a lot about how families feel themselves to be under tremendous, even overwhelming pressures in this day and age, and I truly believe that the right kind of church—definitely Christ Church Pelham among them--can provide a lot of answers to the problems families are facing. As a result, it is my hope that 2024 will see an ever-escalating series of "homecomings" as more

of our Parish family emerges from their hobbit holes and celebrates together in joy and inspiration.

Juneteenth 2024



On June 16, the parish celebrated Juneteenth. At coffee hour, Father Matt spoke about the importance of recognizing and learning about the country's newest federal holiday. Those that were able to stay for coffee hour enjoyed a special lunch organized by the 10 a.m. bible study group, replete with traditional red foods.

Excerpted from the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History & Culture website. On "Freedom's Eve," or the eve of January 1, 1863, the first Watch Night services took place. On that night, enslaved and free African Americans gathered in churches and private homes all across the US awaiting news that the Emancipation Proclamation had taken effect. At the stroke of midnight, all enslaved people in Confederate States were declared legally free.

Even though the Emancipation Proclamation was made effective in 1863, in the westernmost Confederate state of Texas, enslaved people would not be free until June 19, 1865, when some 2,000 Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas and announced that the more than 250,000 enslaved black people in the state, were free by executive decree. This day came to be known as Juneteenth.

Doorkeepers at Christ Church

"I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of wickedness." - Psalm 84:10

Whose is the first welcoming face a visitor to Christ Church sees? The usher standing at the door to the house of God.

These days Christ Church has fourteen dedicated ushers whom you will see standing in the Narthex on Sunday morning, distributing bulletins and weekly events calendars with a "good morning" and a warm smile for veterans and newcomers alike. This dedicated group faithfully serve at the 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. services on Sunday, as well as at funerals and memorial services, not to mention special services during Holy Week, at Christmas, and on other special occasions.

The ushers assure first-time visitors they are welcome to sit anywhere, and invite them to join us for coffee, conversation and a bite to nibble in the church hall afterwards, with clergy and our parishioners.

The ushers also assist those with special needs, opening the doors to accommodate walkers or wheelchairs. Once the processional hymn begins, ushers monitor the doors from the Narthex to make sure that a door hastily flung open by a late arrival does not bowl over a chorister or two.

Special services such as baptisms or memorials often attract a crowd of people new to Christ Church. In those cases, the ushers determine who the family members are and escort them to reserved pews in the front of the church. During the service, ushers contribute to the smooth progress of the worship service, leaving the clergy and congregation to concentrate on their devotions. Among other things, the ushers make a quick headcount, and during the singing of the offertory hymn, pass around the collection plates, then process toward the altar to present them to an acolyte. During the communion, they direct people row-by-row to the front of the church.

After the service, the ushers count and record the offerings they collected, enter the amounts in the record book, and place them in a pouch for storage in the office.

Before COVID we had a roster of as many as 27 ushers. Since then, some have retired; others have moved away; and a few have been "promoted" to serve as acolytes. Meanwhile, one other former usher--Evan Felicetti—now heads the Church's Youth Ministry.

Today, we have two 14-year-olds leading a new generation of ushers, serving at the 8:00 a.m. service.

Outreach: Love in Action

In this age of uncertainty over everything from food and warm clothing, to our emotional and spiritual condition, Romans 12 offers a shining definition of what church outreach means for us. We are instructed to offer ourselves as a living sacrifice, to do humble service in the body of Christ. It is all about putting our love for others, our love for our neighbors, into action.

For the outreach Committee that means helping with such longstanding efforts as Trinity St. Paul's Brown Bag lunch program in New Rochelle, as well as collecting parishioners food pantry donations and sharing them with three other churches that provide free groceries to those in need.

This year our outreach work has also taken a few new turns. In the spring we dedicated all funds raised by our annual Easter Appeal to benefit the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese in Jerusalem. In addition to passing the hat for cash donations, during coffee hour on Palm Sunday we staged an auction of home-baked desserts. Parishioners supplied their delicious homemade baked goods and Father Matt whipped up the bidding as our auctioneer! The Appeal, raised a total of \$6,092 to benefit the Princess Basma Children's Hospital in Jerusalem, currently facing a flood of children injured in the Israel/Gaza conflict. Closer to home donations from our parishioners of gently-used or new clothing items for those in need in the Bronx and Westchester, netted an astonishing 500 winter coats for recipients in the Bronx, where our donation partner was NYC Cares.

Our newest initiative was a partnership with the Sharing Shelf of Westchester during National Menstrual Health Awareness Month in May. The group provided feminine-hygiene products to help fight "period poverty" and give dignity, comfort and self-esteem to girls and young women in our area. Many of them have missed school or work for lack of funds to purchase such products. There is a pink donation box inside the double glass doors at the lower parking lot, where parishioners are encouraged to place unopened boxes of menstrual pads and/or tampons.

SEV Foundation is a 501(c)3 charity founded by Sr. Jackie Atabong, a member of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Therese of the Child Jesus in Cameroon. The Congregation was founded in 1963 to serve the needs of the church, raise the dignity of women and attend to the needs of marginalized people in society. The Sisters serve the church and society through education, health care and socio-pastoral works. As the Congregation grows internationally, we look to extend our services globally. With over a decade of experience working with local women, initiating microfinance groups that get women out of the web of poverty, SEV looks forward to spreading such initiatives to other parts of the world. Empowering women and the girl child in areas where the education of girls is still looked upon as unnecessary is a prime concern for SEV Foundation. SEV seeks to work with interested parties in pursuit of these goals and to offer equal opportunities to all. We partner with individuals, organizations, parishes and dioceses to realize these projects.

Over 200 children have returned to school through our programs and 50 girls have been provided with shelter since 2019 with 15 currently in residence this year. They are sent to school or taught a trade. We also provide for their psychological and medical needs.

There are so many children in need as the conflict in Cameroon rages on, so we thank you for your support, it brought joy and hope to many children.

The children in our care did very well at school this past year and they are very grateful for the donations from Christ Church. It feels good to be acknowledged. Most of the gifts you sent have been distributed while the rest will be given out at the beginning of the academic year in September.



We would like to establish long term projects which, if supported, could be sustainable for the long haul. We currently rent a small house in the city for internally displaced girls and women who do not have the tools to earn a living. We would like to build our own center in a more spacious area and offer training to empower them.

Since my return to Cameroon, I have started a project for training of trainers. I am currently training ten people who would collaborate with me in this job. I live with one other sister and the displaced girls in the rented building. It is a wonderful experience though challenging.
