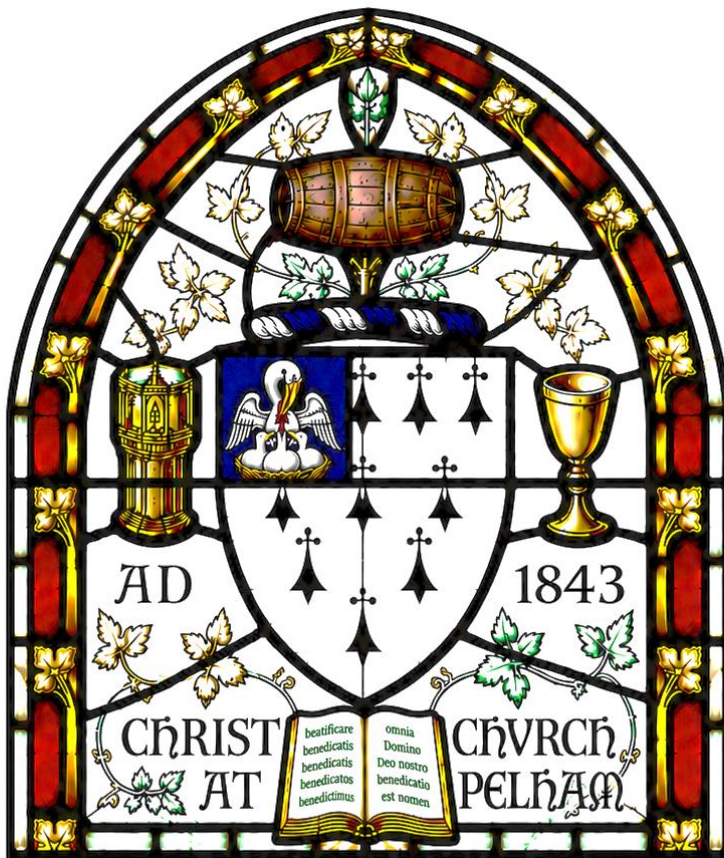

ABOUT CHRIST CHURCH

The Parish of Christ the Redeemer (known as Christ Church) is the Episcopal Church in Pelham, New York. The Episcopal Church is part of the Anglican Communion which is made up of 85 million people in over 165 countries and is the third largest Christian denomination in the world. Christ Church was founded in 1843 and is the first house of worship in Pelham. This building was consecrated on September 15, 1843, the original church building was expanded in 1910, and the sanctuary was reconstructed in 1968 to allow for the current, more intimate worship space. Our congregation draws primarily from Pelham, New Rochelle, Mount Vernon, and the Bronx, and includes people from diverse denominational and cultural backgrounds.

ABOUT THE SEASON AFTER PENTECOST

This period in the Church year is known as “The Season after Pentecost” or “Ordinary Time.” The term “ordinary” refers to how the New Testament passages are generally read in order or in sequence, as opposed to being arranged by specific theme as in other seasons. During this season the Gospel passages focus on Jesus’ ministry, how he is revealed to the world as the Christ, and what he teaches to his followers. In Year A (the first in a three-year cycle: A, B & C) most of the Gospel passages are from the Gospel according to Matthew. When Track 1 is used, the Old Testament Lesson is read in thematic sequence throughout the summer, in Year A we will read from the Pentateuch (first five books of the Bible). The New Testament Lesson is independent of these readings and is almost always taken from one of the Letters in the New Testament that reflects the common life and mission of the first Christian community.

ABOUT TODAY’S SERVICE

The Holy Eucharist, the principal act of Christian worship on the Lord's Day and other major Feasts, and Daily Morning and Evening Prayer, as set forth in the Book of Common Prayer, 1979, are the regular services appointed for public worship in the Episcopal Church. At Christ Church we celebrate the Holy Eucharist every Sunday, and also on Holy Days and other occasions. Today’s liturgy is from the red *Book of Common Prayer* 1979. 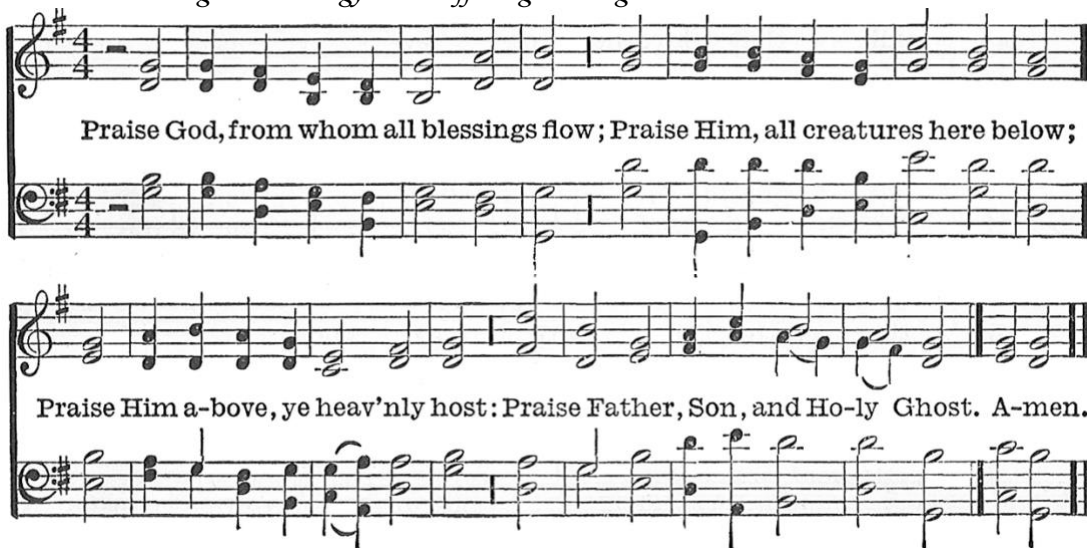

Couperin

Dr. J's Notes

François Couperin (1668–1733), known as “Couperin le Grand,” was one of the most important organists and composers of the French Baroque period. He served as organist of the historic Church of Saint-Gervais in Paris, a position held by the Couperin family for generations, and later became organist and musician to the royal court of Louis XIV. While celebrated today for his refined harpsichord works, Couperin was equally renowned in his lifetime as a church musician whose organ playing embodied the grandeur and elegance of French sacred music. His surviving organ compositions, including the two Masses (*Messe pour les paroisses* and *Messe pour les couvents*), remain masterpieces of the French classical organ tradition. These works offer a vivid glimpse into the sound world of worship in seventeenth- and eighteenth-century Paris, where chant, ritual, and richly colored organ music were closely intertwined. Couperin’s music is especially admired for its grace, expressive nuance, and elegant ornamentation, qualities that helped define the distinctive character of the French Baroque style. Through his sacred and secular music alike, Couperin brought extraordinary beauty, expressiveness, and sophistication to the musical life of both church and court, securing his place among the greatest composers of the Baroque era.
